The Department of Health and Aged Care is committed to making information about COVID-19 vaccines available to everyone in Australia.


This information pack includes translated COVID-19 vaccine information. You are receiving this pack because you are a key stakeholder with important connections in your community.

They encourage people to get their influenza vaccination, stay up to date with their COVID-19 vaccinations, and vaccinate children against COVID-19.





Pregnancy, breastfeeding and COVID-19 vaccines




It is important that pregnant and breastfeeding women are informed so they can get vaccinated against COVID-19.

Oral antiviral treatments for COVID-19


More people are now eligible to access oral antiviral treatments for COVID-19. These can be life saving for people at high risk of severe illness from the COVID-19 virus.

FACT SHEET

Eligibility for fourth COVID-19 vaccine dose



Some people at higher risk of severe illness from COVID-19 are recommended to get a fourth COVID-19 vaccine dose. This can be given at least 3 months after the third dose.



How many vaccine doses do you need?

If you are aged:

50 years and older	four doses	30 to 49 years	three doses, option of fourth
16 to 29 years	three doses	5 to 15 years	two doses

Some people with severe or complex health needs may need additional doses. Talk to your doctor about what is right for you.

Vaccines can be booked 3 months after your last dose or when you tested positive for COVID-19.
